The Colleges and Universities of the Anglican Communion (CUAC) is a world wide association of over 120 institutions of higher education with ties to a branch of the Anglican Communion. CUAC is committed to promoting cross-cultural contacts and educational programs. With institutions on all five continents, CUAC enables the exchange of ideas, the development of programs among member institutions, and the mutual support so that each might better serve its students, its societies, and the world. As a global network of colleges and universities, CUAC strives to assist faculty and students to become better global citizens of our diverse world.

Colleges and Universities of the Anglican Communion

CUAC is essentially a communication and collaboration **network** that links all the Anglican-related colleges and universities world-wide. It is autonomous in governance and self-supporting in finance, based on the presence and contributions of participating colleges.

CUAC provides for its members **means of communication** through the Internet, Newsletters, academic journals, and through both national and international conferences. All these activities help CUAC institutional and individual members to uncover and pursue opportunities in global education, faculty and student exchanges. CUAC colleges create joint programmes in cross cultural discovery, in community and service learning, and in educational and cultural aid for developing nations. Exchange of students, faculty and administrators is a constant activity of member institutions, both to support but also to enrich and broaden each college or university.

CUAC strives to promote the ideals of Christian education in the global world through the dialogues, exchanges and joint projects among our members. It pays special attention to the role of Chaplains in the settings of a contemporary university.

CUAC meets as an international association every three years. Delegates to the conference are selected by the institutions that are contributing members of CUAC. Each conference has a theme and an organizational intent. As much as it is able, CUAC supports attendance at conferences of delegates from member institutions who are unable to meet travel expenses.

CUAC Membership Information

An eligible institution is any college or university that is associated by history and tradition with the Anglican Communion. Applications to join the association are made to the Board of Trustees of the Colleges and Universities of the Anglican Communion. Membership assumes payment of an annual membership fee, as set by the Trustees of CUAC. Each institution has one vote at the Triennial meeting of the association. Each institution designates which of its administration, faculty, or staff are to participate in the association, and who is to vote on behalf of the institution.
