The original St. John's University was established in Shanghai in 1879 by Bishop Joseph Schereschewsky of the American Episcopal Church. It lasted for seventy years, and became one of the most influential universities in China. In 1967 St. John's University was re-established in Taiwan by the Taiwan Episcopal Church and her alumni as a successor to the institution in Shanghai. From modest beginnings as a five year technical institute, we have become a university specializing in technology, with the hope of becoming a full university in the future. It is technology and industry that led Taiwan to become one of the original 'Tiger Economies' of Asia and St. John's has been

at the forefront of developing special relationships between the two. Do come and see for yourselves!
